The highlights of the event were:

- 1. Many praises were given to the USA based Alumni and the monetary contribution made towards the graduation.
- 2. Phul made her speech which incorporated information sent from the Executive Committee stating our goals and vision for helping the school . The names of the Executive Committee members were announced.
- 3. Every graduating student received a trophy. Top achievers received additional awards and the best overall student trophy was donated by The Ministry of Ed. Also the top student in Forms 1 thru 4 each got a trophy as well. By the way these 4 students were all female.

The Executive Committee is pleased with the broad acknowledgement of so many students.

- 4. The ceremony lasted about 3 1/2 hrs. after which refreshments, snacks and food were served. Students then had an after party.

The HM also wants to form an association of alumni still living in Guyana as a few attended the graduation c. The school still provides lunch for about 30 students daily.
